The purpose of this Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention (FVIP) Grant Program is to support the implementation of strategies that will result in the reduction of violent crime within the Commonwealth of Virginia while implementing effective and sustainable intervention and prevention programming to interrupt and prevent local cycles of violence. The current grant solicitation is to support local public housing agencies' efforts to enhance safety and address violent crime. This funding opportunity was open to local public housing agencies only. In the solicitation, DCJS announced that it anticipated awarding six (6) grants totaling approximately \$1,800,000.

Three (3) applications were recommended for denial; two applications were deemed ineligible and one application provided insufficient information.

In summary, DCJS staff request approval to fund six (6) grant applications for the 24-month period (7/1/2025-6/30/2027), totaling \$1,780,304, using the Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention funding allocated for this purpose.

The Y.E.S. program fosters supportive environments for youth living in Norfolk's public housing communities. By actively engaging youth in sports, the program aims to promote health and wellness while reducing the risk of violence. Activities will include organized sports, education, special events, health workshops, mentorship, supportive services, and evaluation efforts. The program expects to serve 300 youth, 125 parents and 100 seniors through intergenerational activities. The requested funding will cover staff expenses and supplies needed to implement grant activities. Funding supports one FTE (40hrs), and supplies (sporting equipment, workshop materials, venue rental, volunteer stipends).	This proposal is a partnership between Newport News Redevelopment and Housing Authority and Old Dominion University's Virginia Modeling, Analysis, and Simulation Center (VMASC). ODU's VMASC provides expertise to community organizations in the Hampton Roads area to encourage regional development. ODU supports creates mutually beneficial partnerships within the community in order to further combat crime and tackle some of the area's most pressing issues. The Work-Integrated Learning (VVIL) program is a firearm violence intervention program that provides group and one-on-one mentoring with Interventionists (violence interrupters), who not only positively encourage at-risk youth through mentoring, education, and employment or entrepreneurship development, but also help to improve parental relationships with local community support services. Funding supports three PTE (20hrs), program supplies (incentives, office supplies) and one consultant.	Peace in the Streetz aims to reduce incidents of violence in communities by promoting education, community engagement, support services, and youth empowerment. The program is a pro-active, holistic solution that will focus on addressing the root causes of violence through a community-based collaborative approach. Peace in the Streets will operate as a holistic violence prevention and intervention resource program for DRHA's public housing communities. DRHA currently owns and manages five public housing properties and would like to offer this program for at least 40 residents (youth and adults). Funding supports one FTE Project Director (40hrs), consultants, travel, equipment (tablets), supplies (mentor scholarships).	In collaboration with multiple community partners, this project will create a collaborative space (utilizing unused public housing space) that will provide youth in the community an opportunity to engage with and participate in art, music, agriculture, workforce development, and more. This project aims to provide youth with a sustainable alternative to violence and create a safe space within our city's second largest public housing site. This space will not only have a positive impact on the youth, but also increase ways to engage with the public housing community and provide a whole family approach to reduction of violence, and specifically gun violence. Funding supports one PTE (16hrs), consultant (TBD) and equipment and supplies (computers, art supplies and agricultural tools).	The Charlottesville Redevelopment and Housing Authority (CRHA) is seeking funding to expand its community-based programs that engage residents in workforce development opportunities, reentry support, and youth development. Funding from this opportunity will increase ability for CRHA's existing workforce development program (the Economic Opportunity Program), including increased support for individuals affected by incarceration, and add dedicated staff to youth programming at public housing sites. To ensure high-quality and non-duplicative services, CRHA is partnering with the Uhuru Foundation for programs with justice-involved individuals. Funding supports one FTE (40hrs), one PTE (4hrs), travel expenses and program supplies.	Grant Project Description
