Name of Person Presenting: Anya Shaffer, Victims of Crime Act Administrator, Victims Services Section

The purpose of the Victims Services Grant Program (VSGP) is to support the delivery of direct services to victims of crime. This funding opportunity offered continuation funding for a group of currently funded subrecipients selected through a competitive application process in 2025. The initial funding opportunity was designed to fulfill the federal requirement that 10% of Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funding support services to victims from underserved populations.

Funding for VSGP comes from both state general funds and federal VOCA funds. There is also a subrecipient match requirement. \$5,167,643 is available for this funding opportunity.

In accordance with VOCA guidelines, direct services to victims of crime include efforts that:

- 1. Respond to the emotional, psychological, or physical needs of crime victims;
- 2. Assist victims to stabilize their lives after victimization;
- 3. Assist victims to understand and participate in the criminal justice system;
- 4. Restore a measure of security and safety for the victim.

This was a continuation funding opportunity and there were **no applications denied**. Two (2) subrecipients requested award amounts that exceeded their predetermined amounts, resulting in \$47 of reductions.

Recommended funding supports the following: 1) personnel (counselors, therapists, victim advocates, volunteer coordinators, supervisory staff, outreach and education staff); 2) supplies (office supplies, printing costs, shelter maintenance, training registrations, victim emergency clothing, victim moving expenses, agency phone and internet services); 3) consultants (translation and interpretation services, victim childcare services, certified public accountants, technology services, victim therapy services); 4) travel (staff mileage and per diem reimbursement for meetings, court accompaniment, hospital accompaniment, and trainings); 5) indirect costs in accordance with a federally negotiated indirect cost rate or the de minimis rate; and 6) training funded by this grant program may be used to train paid staff and volunteers on how to provide services to victims of crime.

In summary, DCJS staff request approval to fund 32 grant applications for the 12-month period (7/1/2025-6/30/2026), totaling \$5,167,643, using \$4,134,113 in state general funds/federal VOCA funds and \$1,033,530 in subrecipient match contributions.

In FY 26 we will serve 100 Spanish-speaking victims of sexual and domestic violence and human trafficking. | The ReadyKids Trauma Counseling Program offers a critical response to the treatment needs of children (ages 2-18) who are victims of crime including abuse, neglect and/or exposure to domestic violence in Charlottesville and the five surrounding counties, including rural communities. The program targets underserved populations including immigrants, non-English speaking clients, LGBTQ individuals and victims of trafficking. Grant funds will be used to support the salaries of 4 Trauma Counselors who provide masters-level trauma counseling for victims & their non-offending caregivers, & Director of Counseling who provides clinical supervision and program oversight. We anticipate serving 150 primary victims and 100 secondary victims during the grant period. | Project Horizon serves victims of domestic and sexual violence in the Rockbridge community which includes Buena Vista, Lexington and Rockbridge County. We provide comprehensive information and direct services to sexual assault and domestic violence victims. It is estimated that during July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026 (FY26), over 500 victims of domestic violence or sexual assault will receive direct services through this program. We anticipate that similar to previous years, nearly 40% of the people we serve will represent marginalized victims. Services in this proposal will be provided by 3 staff and approximately 35 volunteers. | Piedmont CASA Bridges to Success for Older Youth in Foster Care (Bridges) provides for three full-time Coaches who are primarily responsible for providing individualized and professional support to 30 to 35 CASA youth, ages 13 to 18+. Bridges Coaches work directly with these older CASA youth to help them develop a comprehensive, holistic, and measurable plan to guide and support their transition to self-sufficiency and to living an independent, interdependent life. Working closely with CASA Supervisors and CASA Volunteers, Bridges Coaches help to ensure that these youth receive all necessary and appropriate support and advocacy services to thrive and to achieve their specific life goals. |

| The WRCNRY VOCA Victim Services Program provides comprehensive direct services to adult and child victims of sexual and domestic violence. VSGP grant funds will be used to adult and child victims of sexual and domestic violence. VSGP grant funds will be used to pay salary and benefits for three staff who will provide information & referral, personal advocacy and accompaniment, emotional support and salety, and criminal & civil justice system assistance. This project includes direct services for victims of child abuse and comprehensive services for victims of sexual and domestic violence. It is estimated that during SFY 2026, 225 victims will receive direct services through this funding. | Project COURAGE provides services to children in grades 5-8, their sibling and all eligible students in the alternative education programs who have been the victim of a crime (abuse, stalking, bullying, child porn) or witnessed a crime (domestic violence, murder, etc.). The program also supports the students' parents at least monthly (through advice, access to services to assist with housing needs/food, referrals to additional services to support their child, etc.) Children are seen weekly at school by a COURAGE worker and by a volunteer mentor at parent's request who eats with the student. The goal is to serve 80 students. Three staff at the Warren Coalition will provide services. | VSGP grant funds will be used to cover the full-time salary of two staff and a portion of the salary for three staff to serve an underserved population of low-income, undocumented or under-documented immigrant victims of domestic and/or sexual violence crimes by opening, managing, and/or filing visa applications (VAWA Self-Petitions, U visas, T visas, Removal of Conditions on Residence) and/or Adjustment of Status applications; "green card") for 100 eligible clients; provide information and training on immigration visa relief available to immigrant victims of domestic and/or sexual violence crimes to 5 local core services programs in Virginia; and prepare 5 visa applicants to attend USCIS Field Office appointments. | VSGP grants funds will be used to pay part of the salaries of our domestic violence team: four attorneys, one case handling paralegal, and one community outreach coordinator.
