The purpose of the Victims Services Grant Program for Sexual and Domestic Violence Services (VSGP-SDVS) is to support the delivery of direct services to sexual assault and domestic violence victims. Funding comes from both State General Funds allocated to support sexual assault and domestic violence victims and federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funds, awarded to DCJS by the U.S. Department of Justice's Office for Victims of Crime. \$19,165,934 is available for this funding opportunity.

In accordance with VOCA guidelines, direct services to victims of crime include efforts that:

- 1. Respond to the emotional, psychological, or physical needs of crime victims;
- 2. Assist victims to stabilize their lives after victimization:
- 3. Assist victims to understand and participate in the criminal justice system; OR
- 4. Restore a measure of security and safety for the victim.

This was a continuation funding opportunity and there were no applications denied.

Recommended funding supports the following: 1) personnel (counselors, therapists, victim advocates, volunteer coordinators, supervisory staff, outreach and education staff); 2) supplies (office supplies, printing costs, shelter maintenance, training registrations, victim emergency clothing, victim moving expenses, agency phone and internet services); 3) consultants (translation and interpretation services, victim childcare services, certified public accountants, technology services, victim therapy services); 4) travel (staff mileage and per diem reimbursement for meetings, court accompaniment, hospital accompaniment, and trainings); 5) indirect costs in accordance with a federally negotiated indirect cost rate or the de minimis rate; and 6) training funded by this grant program may be used to train paid staff and volunteers on how to provide services to victims of crime.

In summary, DCJS staff request approval to fund 55 grant applications for the 12-month period (7/1/2025-6/30/2026), totaling \$19,165,934, using federal VOCA and state general funds allocated for this purpose. \*Alternatively, if approved in the FY2026 state budget bill awaiting action by Governor Youngkin, an additional \$2,000,000 in state general funding will be added to this funding opportunity using the same requirements set forth in the grant guidelines to fund the grant applications totaling \$21,165,934. Updated individual grant amounts will be provided at the May 8, 2025 CJSB Meeting.

| The Victim Services Grant Program-Sexual and Domestic Violence Services (VSGP-SDVS) funds will be used pay salary and benefits for 7 full time staff and 4 part time staff. The funds will be used to provide free, comprehensive and confidential support services to those experiencing domestic and/or sexual violence. Services include a 24-hour hottine, emergency shelter, case management, peer counseling, licensed therapy, legal and housing advocacy, and community outreach and education. (Phoices anticipates serving 80 women and 60 children with advocacy services and responding to 500 survivors via hotline and text/chat communications. | Bridges of Change offers emergency shelter to victims of domestic violence, stalking, sexual assault & human trafficking. The 24 hour holine will serve 150 callers & will house 75 clients in FY26. Staff will recruit, train & place 20 volunteers in FY26. Clients will be referred for community services to social services, domestic violence programs, victim witness programs, & daw enforcement. Staff will offer crisis intervention, transportation, assistance with job placement, & support groups. Grant funds will be used to pay the salary & benefits package for the full time Shelter Manager, who will serve clients, offer case management, & manage the shelter on a daily basis. | Bedford Domestic Violence Services provides comprehensive Information and direct services to domestic violence victims. We will provide services to 255 individuals in emergency and community-based services, 56 on scene crisis via JAP programming, and 56 children/families from July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2026. Services include supportive care, mobile advocacy, licensed therapy, safety planning, emergency legal/medical accompaniment, civil/criminal court advocacy, education, emergency shelter, etc. Community services Include awareness/education, technical assistance/consultation, P5As, community coordination, etc. | VSGP-SDVS grant funds will be used to pay prorated salary of 2 administrative staff and the salanes of 4 staff who will provide crisis intervention, hospital/court accompaniment, salety planning, assistance with basic needs, safe/confidential-emergency shelter, transitional housing, crisis holline, 24-hour support, support groups, counseling, housing/utility assistance, children's service, outreach and community referrals. FCSS will offer a comprehensive array of services to address the complex needs of survivors and their families. FCSS anticipates serving 300 victims with these funds during this grant period. | In Fairfax County, the VOCA VSGP_SOVS grant will support the expansion and enhancement of direct services to victims and family members impacted by sexual and domestic violence, human trafficking, and stalking and to improve equity in service access and delivery. Grant funds will be used to pay the salaries of four staff (2 FTE, 1.75 FTE, 1.40 FTE) who will provide crisis line support, advocacy, and counseling for victims and those impacted by sexual and domestic violence, human trafficking and stalking.
