Re: FY2026 Pretrial Jail Expansion (Earmarked) Funding

Name of person presenting: Angelica Brown, Grant Monitoring Coordinator, Adult Justice Programs

The purpose of Pretrial Jail Expansion Earmarked Funding Opportunity is to support expanded Comprehensive Community Corrections and Pretrial Services Act (CCCA/PSA) Programs for localities belonging to the Central Virginia Regional Jail Authority and the Southwest Virginia Regional Jail Authority. Programs are established and operated under the authority of the Comprehensive Community-Corrections Act for Local Responsible Offenders (CCCA, § 9.1-173) and the Pretrial Services Act (PSA, § 19.2-152.2) of the *Code of Virginia*.

Award amounts are designated in the Appropriation Act and reflect 75% of the costs projected for expanded services in the community-based correction plan submitted by each Authority at the time of their jail expansion. In accordance with the Appropriation Act, the localities are required to provide the remaining 25% as a condition of receiving these funds.

These funds are proposed to be expended on salaries and fringe benefits of sworn pretrial officers, office supplies, VCIN software, drug testing supplies, rent for office space, and telephone costs for operations.

In summary, **DCJS staff request approval to fund two (2) grant applications for the 12-month period (7/1/2025-6/30/2026) totaling \$1,100,000**, using \$825,000 in state general funds allocated for this purpose and \$275,000 in subrecipient match contribution.
