Re: Victims Services Grant Program, Competitive Applications for State Fiscal Year 2025

The purpose of the Victims Services Grant Program (VSGP) is to support the delivery of direct services to victims of crime. Funding for this grant program comes from federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funds, administered by the U.S. Department of Justice's Office for Victims of Crime. In addition, state general funds have been appropriated to support this program. In accordance with VOCA guidelines, direct services to victims of crime include efforts that:

- 1. Respond to the emotional, psychological, or physical needs of crime victims;
- 2. Assist victims to stabilize their lives after victimization;
- 3. Assist victims to understand and participate in the criminal justice system; OR
- 4. Restore a measure of security and safety for the victim.

VOCA requires that a minimum of 10% of each state's award must fund projects that support victims from underserved populations; therefore, this competitive funding opportunity prioritized projects designed to serve underserved populations.ⁱ

For State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2025, DCJS staff request approval to award \$1,246,330 in state general funds to 11 victim serving organizations.

The requests for funds from applicants exceeded the funds available for this grant program by approximately \$8 million. DCJS received 77 applications. On May 9, 2024, the Criminal Justice Services Board approved funding for 21 projects from this solicitation. Since that time, additional state general funds were appropriated to support additional VSGP competitive applications. As a result, staff request approval to support 11 additional projects from this solicitation.

In summary, DCJS staff **request approval to fund 11 projects** for the 12-month period (7/1/2024–6/30/2025), **totaling \$1,246,330**, using state general funds allocated for this purpose.

[†]DCJS's other VOCA-supported funding opportunities address the other VOCA priority areas: sexual assault, domestic violence, and child abuse.
