PRESENTER BIOGRAPHIES

JEFFREY AARON

Dr. Jeffrey Aaron, Ph.D. is a clinical and forensic psychologist. Currently the Juvenile Justice and Behavioral Health Program Manager for the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, he previously spent almost 18 years at the Commonwealth Center for Children and Adolescents, Virginia's only public psychiatric hospital for children and adoles-cents, in clinical roles and as the hospital's director. Dr. Aaron is an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and Neurobehavioral Sciences at the University of Virginia Medical School and associate faculty at the UVA Institute of Law, Psychiatry and Public Policy. He also has a private practice in which he conducts forensic psycho-logical evaluations of adolescents and adults, with areas of specialization that include evaluation of confessions, mitigation, post-traumatic stress, and juvenile justice. Dr. Aaron has provided invited testimony before the Virginia House and Senate and has presented across the country on topics including forensic psychological evaluation, adolescent development, legal decision-making, the impact of trauma, and clinical assessment of children and adolescents. He was a member of the Mental Health Workgroup of the Governor's Task Force on School and Campus Safety, the Charlottesville/Albemarle gang intervention project known as Gang Reduction through Active Community Engagement (GRACE), and the Virginia Interagency Task Force charged with making recommendations to the Virginia General Assembly regarding the transformation of Virginia's juvenile justice system. He is actively involved in developing systems to train public safety officers and was recently sworn in as a reserve sheriff's deputy.

FIONA BROWN

Fiona Brown is a Licensed Professional Counselor in Virginia. For nearly 20 years she has helped teens, families, and professionals understand substance use and addiction as a physical and mental health issue. She has experience as a substance abuse treatment provider in community mental health and private practice and has served as a substance abuse prevention and intervention specialist in a public-school setting. She has trained education, mental health, and law enforcement professionals on identifying and responding to teen substance use using a trauma-informed and culturally responsive approach. Ms. Brown is the author of a parenting guide to understanding, preventing, and responding to teen substance use, titled "Read This and Call Me in the Morning", a prescription for teen substance use prevention *with cartoons*. In her writing, training, and public speaking, she uses humor and audience participation to help demystify this topic and encourage critical thinking.

Bryan Carr is a training consultant and presenter, formerly with Deisinger Consulting, LLC, a professional services firm specializing in operational psychology, behavioral health, and behavioral threat assessment, and currently as an independent consultant. His formal education training includes a Bachelor of Science in Education from the University of Virginia and a Master of Science in Counselor Education from Virginia Commonwealth University. In addition to his responsibilities of developing and supervising the school counseling program in CCPS, he was a leader in writing and implementing the district's threat assessment and management protocol. Mr. Carr along with his colleague, Dr. Jim Russo, created the CCPS threat assessment and management training program, educating hundreds of administrators, school counselors, school psychologists, school nurses, and law enforcement partners on best practices and strategies to keep students, staff, and community members safe. Mr. Carr has presented at several workshops, lectures, and conferences on the role of school administration and student support personnel in promoting student achievement, social/emotional learning, and safety including the Virginia School Counselors Conference, the Virginia Counselors Association Convention, the Virginia School Board Association Convention, as well as the Schools of Education at the University of Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth University, and the College of William and Mary.

He is presently serving as a consultant for safety and emergency management for the Jeffco School District in Colorado and continues to travel nationally and internationally, speaking and consulting.
