The Albemarle County Police Department is proposing the second year of the program will focus on continued team training and development. The funding supports the Police Sergeant serving as the unit supervisor; other unit members' involvement is requested in Overtime or special assignment while on duty. The team will continue to be involved in problem solving projects such as repeat call addresses, drugs, gangs, burglaries, families in crisis, vandalisms and vehicle break-ins.

Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The POP Unit took longer than expected to get started due to administrative issues and staffing shortages; a Sergeant was selected and put in place in December 2015. The POP unit has quickly accomplished many notable successful operations since December 2015. The POP Sergeant and additional overtime officers have been involved in a range of operations in the last 5 months, including Operation Safe Shopper 2015; the success of this operation was one of the grant Objectives designed to target and reduce crime during the holiday shopping season. Outlaw Motorcycle Gang Surveillance was conducted; Randolph Court Surveillance was conducted for suspected drug trafficking in January of 2016; a Prostitution Operation was conducted on 01/21/16 with surveillance and an undercover officer that lead to 2 arrests; and a Gang Operation was conducted in 01/16 related to activity at a local high school that involved surveillance and coordinated communications, leading to arrests and student transfers. The program has achieved notable programmatic success under the direction of Sergeant Walls.

Danville/Pittsylvania Community Services will partner with Danville Public Schools and the Danville Redevelopment and Housing Authority to implement the "Steps to Respect" Program. The program will conduct Botvin Life Skills Training, an Evidence Based Program that promotes healthy alternatives to risky behavior and "Safe Dates", an Evidence Based Program that has been proven to reduce violence. The goal is to build pro-social skills that reduce risk factors in adolescents that lead to delinquency. The Botvin Life Skills program will be taught to all 5th and 7th graders in Danville Public Schools, and taught to 4th, 9th, and 10th graders who reside in Danville Redevelopment and Housing sites. "Safe Dates" will be conducted in all 9th Grade classes in Danville Public Schools, and for youth ages 15-18 at Danville Redevelopment and Housing sites.

Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

Danville/Pittsylvania Community Services has partnered with Danville Public Schools and the Danville Redevelopment and Housing Authority to implement the Steps to Success Program. The program is implementing Botvin Life Skills training, and "Safe Dates". Steps to Success has served over 829 elementary, middle and high school students from nine schools throughout the city. The Safe Dates program was conducted in George Washington High School for six classes of 9th grade students, 301 students successfully completed all ten sessions. The Life Skills curriculum was presented to 511 5th and 7th grade students in eight Danville schools. Based on post test scores the program objectives were exceeded by both Safe Dates and Life Skills. The After School Clubhouse program was implemented at four sites operated by the Danville Redevelopment and Housing Authority. Seventeen youth have been served to date.

Space of His Own Creative Mentorship Program targets low-income, disadvantaged boys in Alexandria who lack positive adult male role models and aims to prevent juvenile involvement in crime. The program engages participants through hands-on math, basic carpentry instruction, and visual arts instruction. SOHO develops life skills in the areas of healthy eating, social skills, anger management, conflict resolution, gang prevention, etiquette, and community service. Participants and mentors develop, design plan a personalized space-of-his-own that encourages creativity, conveys a sense of value and worth, and gives a lasting reminder of his circle of support and care. The program seeks to have a lasting impact by fostering one-to-one mentor and peer-group relationships beyond the yearlong program. SOHO utilizes evidence-based life skills curricula and follows the National Mentoring Partnership's model program guidelines.

Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

Space Of His Own (SOHO) successfully recruited screened and trained ten mentors to work with ten youth, who are deemed to be at risk and who are referred by middle schools in Alexandria. Shelf and lamp projects this year have promoted STEM learning, and skillbuilding that is transferable to the classroom. The art and carpentry classes have been well received by both mentors and mentees. Life skills have been taught weekly, utilizing occasionally using guest speakers. The Life Skills curriculum and pre/posttest are currently undergoing evaluation by Marymount University. All program objectives are currently being met according to established time frames. In addition to fulfilling their mentor obligations with SOHO they participated in a city sponsored initiative to develop strategies to recruit more mentors and participated in a city wide fundraising event to ensure that the program is sustained when funding expires.

The Boys and Girls Club of the Northern Neck (BGCNN) is requesting 2nd year funding to implement two Evidenced Based curriculums: the Second Step Violence Prevention Program and the Boys and Girls Club of America's Project Learn. The target populations are students who reside in Lancaster and Northumberland Counties, who are experiencing academic deficiencies related to truancy, poor behavior, grades and low standardized testing scores. The program will be delivered during after school hours and will be held at local schools and the BGCNN Club House. The program's goals are to decrease physically aggressive behavior, and to increase self-competency and academic performance.

Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

To date, the program has served 51 youth, which exceeds the projected number of youth to be served. All participants have completed pre-test surveys and baselines have been established for each participant. Staff members have been trained and are delivering both curriculums. The program has been successful in recruiting volunteers who assist in tutoring program participants. The Boys Club of the Northern Neck (BGCNN) and Northumberland County Public schools have developed a partnership and as a result, BGCN has full use of school facilities for all program activities. Northumberland Public Schools is assisting BGCNN in setting up a control group for youth who were referred but did not enroll in the program. The data analysis will not be complete until later this year, anecdotal comments from school personnel indicated improvement in program participants. The program has experienced some challenges in scheduling an evening that parents would be able to attend. The program is on schedule to meet the program objectives.

The Western Tidewater Community Services Board (WTCSB) is requesting 2nd year funding to implement the Strong African American Families (SAAF) Curriculum in the City of Franklin and Southampton County. Strong African American Families is an Evidence Based seven-week alcohol, drug use and early sexual activity reduction program, which focuses on rural African American youths (ages 10-14). The program works to strengthen the attachment between parent and child to reduce the likelihood of youth involvement in various problem behaviors, particularly risky sexual activity and substance abuse. It also works to promote the youths' ability to focus on goals for the future, resist involvement in risky behaviors, maintain negative images of risk behaviors and peers who engage in them, and accept parental influence. The (WTCSB) Western Tidewater along with its partners plans to deliver programming in 14 seven-week cycles to groups of approximately 10-12 families of middle school aged youth each cycle.

Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The Western Tidewater Community Service Board (WTCSB) recruited and trained staff in the Strong African American Families (SAAF) curriculum within the established time frames guidelines established by WTCSB. The seven week (SAAF) curriculum is being delivered to middle school aged children and their families who reside in the City of Franklin and the County of Southampton. Referrals are made by community partners, based on demonstrated risk factors, the program also accepts self-referrals. WTCSB has secured six community based sites to conduct the program. Results of pre and posttests from parents showed marked improvement in listening to their children, ability to approach situation in a calm manner and consistence in setting limits. Child care is provided during groups and structured activities and transportation has been provided to eight families. WTCSB has delivered four cycles to date. There are currently four cycles ongoing or in the planning stages in Franklin, and two in Southampton County. WTCSB has scheduled additional cycles which will meet the targeted goal of fourteen. Recruiting families has been more difficult than expected in Southampton County due the rural geography. In addition, the WTCSB has decided that groups required two facilitators due to literacy issues and to ensure that participants were able to comprehend and participate.
