## Grant Project Description

Program provides training and assistance to medium and high risk offenders as they transition from incarceration into the community and family environment. Provides pre and post release services such as work release and HEM. Services also include housing, employment, peer support, family and substance abuse recovery. Funding requested will support a full-time program director position.

## Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

NWRADC has excelled in establishing an evidence-based reentry program available within the facility. The program has exceeded its expected performance in FY16, and has expanded the components of effective reentry to all program staff within the jail. Staff are trained to utilize the validated risk and needs assessment, and is working with jail administration to develop policy and procedures that reflect the components of an evidence-based jail reentry program that aims to reduce recidivism. Program and service delivery will be directed to those at higher risk for reoffending among the sentenced population, with a continuum of services provided based on individual risk and needs.

## Staff Recommendation/Comments

NWRADC is exceeding expected performance and has demonstrated a commitment to enhancing the prerelease services provided to inmates at the jail. It is recommended that the program be funded as requested.

## Grant Project Description

Provides pre and post incarceration transition services to state and local offenders. These services include risk/needs assessment; case supervision; transportation and housing assistance; and job readiness for the incarcerated offender. Funds requested are for personnel, consultants for programming services, travel, and program supplies and materials.

## Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The James City County ORTS program has worked diligently over the last year to institutionalize effective reentry services to the clients served at the Virginia Peninsula Regional Jail and upon their release from incarceration. The program is on target to meet its goals for FY16, and has continued to build a supportive network of recidivism reduction services in the community. Colonial ORTS routinely assesses clients with a validated risk and needs assessment, and provides evidence-based cognitive programming to higher risk clients in an effort to improve reintegration success. The community partnerships built by the program include a strong mentoring program and partnerships to provide critical stabilization services such as housing and transportation. Each client received a continuum of services unique to his/her individual needs to ensure successful transition.

## Staff Recommendation/Comments

Colonial Offender Reentry Program is performing well and working to enhance collaborative and coordinated reentry services. A partnership has been strengthened with another area program to enhance the job-readiness services offered within the VPRJ through a MOA, which is an innovative way to utilize effective services available in the geographic area. It is recommended that the program is funded as requested.

### Grant Project Description

OAR provides classes in the Arlington and Alexandria jails in preparation for clients coming out and coming to OAR for reentry services, including; job readiness, socialization activities, case management, referrals to mental health and other health services, referrals to housing and food assistance, job search, clothing and ID's. Funding requested is for personnel and supplies.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

OAR-Arlington has continued to enhance the Intensive Reentry Program at the local jails and correctional institutions in FY16. Program staff have formed a treatment team to provide effective, intensive wrap-around services to those clients at highest risk for reoffending. OAR has incorporated risk screening and assessment as a foundational practice for the IRP, and works to provide services that are unique and comprehensive for clients. To enhance the capacity of the program to serve reentering clients, volunteers have been incorporated into the service delivery model to ensure all interactions align with evidence-based reentry practices. OAR-Arlington and the services provided have been recognized by the local jail and sheriffs as a strong and critical component to successful reintegration of clients released to the community.

### Staff Recommendation/Comments

OAR-Arlington has been a leader in adopting evidence-based practices and innovative approaches to successful reentry. It is recommended that the program be funded as requested.

## Grant Project Description

OAR emphasizes helping formerly incarcerated men and women to obtain and maintain employment since this is a key factor to reducing recidivism. Services include mental health and substance abuse referrals, housing referrals, life skills training, peer support, case management, pro-social community activities and family support services. Funding requested is for personnel, consultant services, and supplies.

## Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

OAR-Fairfax is performing well in meeting its goals in FY16. During the fiscal year, OAR has actively worked with its partners and staff to craft a reentry services model that meets both local needs and the individual needs of clients in an effort to reduce the risk for reoffending upon release. OAR has continued to build its community partnerships and implement programming that is known to effectively address the factors that contribute to recidivism. OAR has continued to build its partnerships with jails and the community to focus on prerelease services and those that have recently been released during the most vulnerable time for reintegration. Additionally, OAR has worked with a local EBDM policy team to enhance a reentry service model for Prince William/Manassas Adult Detention Center. The OAR-Fairfax model clearly incorporates the new performance measures for PAPIS programs, and has been an active partner with DCJS to explore technology solutions for the programs through a strong data collection process.

## Staff Recommendation/Comments

OAR-Fairfax continues to be a strong leader in reentry services in northern Virginia, and is expected to exceed target for FY16. It is recommended that the program be funded as requested.

### Grant Project Description

OAR offers programs that provide the skills and support for the offender to successfully transition into the community. Funding requested is for personnel, supplies and programming materials.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

OAR-Richmond is expected to meet its performance targets for FY16. OAR has worked to incorporate the established performance measures into their service delivery model, which includes enhancing the prerelease coordination of services specifically in the Richmond City Justice Center by dedicating a case manager to the facility, enhancing the use of the validated risk and needs assessment and other validated screens for mental health and substance abuse needs. Cognitive-behavioral programming is offered to higher risk clients, all services are designated based on the client risk for reoffending and specific needs of the individual and a focus on increasing the involvement of positive family supports have all contributed to OAR's program model. The services at OAR are inclusive of a strong, evidence-based, and effective elements that provide the best opportunity for client successful reintegration upon release and continued success.

### Staff Recommendation/Comments

OAR is on target to meet the goals for FY16, and has been recognized as a critical reentry service provider in the local community. It is recommended that the program be funded as requested.

### Grant Project Description

Provide reentry services through prerelease programs at the Albemarle/Charlottesville Regional Jail and the Central Virginia Regional Jail and provide post release services for offenders once released from jail or prison. OAR serves 9 jurisdictions and the target population are those incarcerated preparing for release in the local jails and those who are released from jail/prison returning to the areas served. Budget requests include personnel, travel, equipment maintenance, and supplies.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

OAR-JACC has worked in FY16 to incorporate the new PAPIS Performance Measures for evidence-based reentry services into their program, and are on target to meet the goals. All reentry staff are utilizing the OST, a validated recidivism risk and needs assessment, to target intensive reentry services to higher risk clients and those nearing release and recently released from Virginia jails and prisons. OAR-JACC has worked to enhance community reentry efforts that include the local reentry councils, the local department of human services, social services, and the local regional jail. OAR-JACC anticipates reaching the following goals over the next two fiscal years: Reduce recidivism rates of medium and high risk clients by 25% for program completers versus non-completers; Increase successful reintegration, specifically focusing on enhancing employment retention; and increasing access to critical social, emergency, transition, and stabilization services for at least 125 clients. OAR-JACC aims to accomplish these goals through their continued use of evidence-based reentry services, designated reentry service tracks based on client risk for reoffending, and continuing to build a collaborative and coordinated reentry continuum through community partnerships and the regional jail. It is recommended to fund as requested.

### Staff Recommendation/Comments

OAR-JACC continues to be a leader in the field of community-based reentry services in Virginia. It is recommended that the program is funded as requested.

STEP-UP, Inc. has performed well and is on target to meet the established performance expectations for FY16.

### Staff Recommendation/Comments

STEP-UP, Inc. has planned to enhance the prerelease and post-incarceration services in the next 24 months by including evidence-based reentry services driven by a validated risk and needs assessment to determine levels and types of reentry services aimed at reductions in recidivism. The program has worked to enhance the local reentry systems framework to support evidence-based practices, and target resources to those nearing release and recently released from Virginia jails and prisons in the Tidewater area. STEP-UP has also enhanced workforce services within area institutions, and has worked to form a partnership to expand these services to the Virginia Peninsula Regional Jail working with another of the PAPIS programs. It is recommended that the program is funded as requested.

### Grant Project Description

VA CARES provides prerelease and post-release reentry services at direct services sites through 5 subcontracted sites throughout Virginia. Prerelease services focus on case management and reentry planning, while intensive post-release services include standardized programming (Thinking for a Change and peer support groups), educational workshops, job readiness and employment placement, and individual case management. VA CARES' sites use a validated risk and needs assessment, along with emergency and transitional needs to develop reentry service plans for clients served.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

VA CARES is on target for activities for FY16, and have worked with DCJS to adopt program changes that are reflective of the established DCJS/PAPIS Performance Measures.

### Staff Recommendation/Comments

VA CARES has adjusted the localities served through this funding to ensure that it is clear the reentry service provider and eliminate duplication of reentry services in certain localities. Increased partnerships with jails are reflected in the current application; however, it is noted that the direct service sub-contracted sites have struggled with programmatic changes and availability of reentry services to the areas served. It is recommended that VA CARES is funded as requested with special conditions throughout the grant cycle.

To enhance the capacity of the program to serve reentering clients, program staff have engaged with jail administration to modify programming policies within the jail to implement a service delivery model to ensure all interactions align with evidence-based reentry practices. Community partnerships through the reentry councils support the coordinated continuum of reentry services as individuals transition from incarceration to release.
