### Grant Project Description

The "City of Promise" initiative targets three communities and focuses on creating a continuum of services focused on improving the educational and developmental outcomes for children in the targeted communities. The Check and Connect program provides comprehensive student engagement and intervention for truant youth or youth who are at risk for truancy. The program operates at Burnley-Moran Elementary School, Venable Elementary School and Walker Upper Elementary School.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The Charlottesville City of Promise Check and Connect Student Engagement Program has been providing effective truancy prevention services for two years at Walker Upper Elementary School and Burnley-Moran Elementary School in the Charlottesville City School system. The program is currently serving 26 students and their families and has met the objectives of improved attendance and decreased school suspensions. Check and Connect students improved their attendance by 55% after they were enrolled in the Check and Connect program and 86% of the students had no out-of-school suspensions or expulsions.

## Grant Project Description

Danville/Pittsylvania Community Services will partner with Danville Public Schools and the Danville Redevelopment and Housing Authority to implement the "Steps to Respect" Program. The program will conduct Botvin Life Skills Training, an Evidence Based Program that promotes healthy alternatives to risky behavior and "Safe Dates", an Evidence Based Program that has been proven to reduce violence. The goal is to build pro-social skills that reduce risk factors in adolescents that lead to delinquency. The Botvin Life Skills program will be taught to all 5th and 7th graders in Danville Public Schools, and taught to 4th, 9th, and 10th graders who reside in Danville Redevelopment and Housing sites. "Safe Dates" will be conducted in all 9th Grade classes in Danville Public Schools, and for youth ages 15-18 at Danville Redevelopment and Housing sites.

## Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The program has served over 695 elementary, middle and high school students in nine schools throughout the City of Danville. The program is projected to serve an additional 135 in the final quarter of the grant year. The Safe Dates program was conducted at George Washington High School for 8 classes of 9th grade students. 110 students successfully completed the program; the program is projected to serve 225 students by the end of the current grant year. 73% of the students increased their knowledge of the factors that constitute healthy relationships and factors that constitute abusive relationships. The Life Skills curriculum was conducted with 572 5th and 7th grade students; 70% increased their knowledge regarding the immediate consequences of substance abuse.

### Grant Project Description

The Southside Survivor Resource Center (formerly CAFV) will be providing evidence based prevention programming to prevent dating violence and victimization, including psychological, physical and sexual abuse that may occur between youth involved in dating by implementing the evidence base primary prevention programming "Safe Dates" to Martinsville Middle School students. The summer enrichment and afterschool program will implement the evidenced based PATHS curriculum, at the Boys and Girls Club of the Blue Ridge and the Coaching Boys into Men (CBIM) curriculum will be implemented with middle and high school athletes and their coaches.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The Safe Dates Curriculum has been administered to 156 Martinsville Middle School students (38 percent were male and 62 percent were female students.) Posttest scores of students who completed the program indicated that 90 percent reported an increased awareness of community services and an increased knowledge of recognizing and responding to signs of abuse (physical, verbal and sexual). Pretest results from CBIM participants show 20 percent of male athletes did not identify abusive behaviors in relationships and at least 30 percent of participants were uncertain of their decision to intervene in abusive relationships among their peers. Post test results indicated that at the end of the season all of the 68 male athletes accurately identified abusive behaviors in relationships, were aware of community services and were more likely intervene in situations involving abusive behaviors.

### Grant Project Description

The Boys and Girls Club of the Northern Neck (BGCNN) is requesting funding to continue the implementation of two Evidenced Based curriculums: the Second Step Violence Prevention Program and BGC's Project Learn. The program is currently serving 50 youth who are experiencing academic deficiencies due to truancy, poor behavior, and low academic performance and operates after school in two locations, Northumberland Middle School and the BGNN clubhouse in Kilmarnock.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The program has been successful in recruiting volunteers who assist in tutoring program participants. The Boys Club of the Northern Neck (BGCNN) and Northumberland County Public Schools have developed a partnership and as a result, BGCNN has full use of school facilities for all program activities. Northumberland Public Schools is assisting BGCNN in setting up a control group for youth who were referred but did not enroll in the program. The data analysis will not be complete until later this year, anecdotal comments from school personnel indicated improvement in program participants. The program has experienced some challenges in scheduling an evening that parents would be able to attend. The program is on schedule to meet the program objectives.

## Grant Project Description

The Warren Coalition will conduct the Second Step Program, a program that teaches empathy and coping skills, to students in three elementary schools and one middle school. Second Step is an evidenced based program that focuses on providing skills to students that strengthen their ability to cope with their feelings in positive ways, treat others with kindness, deal with disappointments and recognize differences among people. Students who are identified with anger management issues or problems managing anxiety will be referred for one on one anger management sessions with trained Warren Coalition staff members.

## Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The program has experienced an increase in referrals for individual services. There are currently 23 individual referrals for individual services. The program has also been providing services to special education and homebound students who experience anxiety that makes it unable for them to participate in the regular classroom. The E. Wilson Memorial Elementary School has made the Second Step part of the PBIS Team. One of the issues last year was the timely receipt of assessments. During the current grant year applications are required to be completed by the parents and teachers before referrals.

### Grant Project Description

The Western Tidewater Community Services Board (WTCSB) is requesting continuation funding for the Strong African American Families (SAAF) Curriculum in the City of Franklin and Southampton County. Strong African American Families is an Evidence Based seven-week alcohol, drug use and early sexual activity reduction program, which focuses on rural African American youths (ages 10-14). The program works to strengthen the attachment between parent and child, reduce the likelihood of youth involvement in risky sexual activity and substance abuse.

### Project Performance to Date (if Continuation)

The program delivered 10 seven week program cycles to small groups at nine different sites located in the City of Franklin, South Hampton County, the City of Suffolk and Isle Wight County. Transportation was provided for 14 families to and from program sites, and child care was provided for 30 children. The results of pre and posttests of the parents showed marked improvement in listening to their children, improvement in their ability to remain calm, and consistency in setting limits.
