Re: Fiscal Year 2025 Prerelease and Post Incarceration Services (PAPIS) Grant Funding Recommendations

The Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) administers general appropriation funds designated to support the Prerelease and Post Incarceration Services (PAPIS) programs to provide direct services to incarcerated individuals nearing release into the community, or previously incarcerated individuals living in the community. This grant is intended specifically to facilitate case management, reentry success planning, to provide resources to meet basic needs, transitional housing, treatment, referrals, and employment readiness and placement for individuals returning to the community from prison or a local or regional jail.

For Fiscal Year (FY) 2025, DCJS received nine applications from the existing PAPIS programs for a total request of \$4,157,654. Applicants were asked to submit a needs-based application and budget for FY2025 with the understanding that funding levels would change little to none between FY2024 and FY2025. Applications were reviewed for appropriate programming and reasonable, allowable budgets. DCJS staff recommends funding the PAPIS programs at FY2024 level funding.

No applications were denied.

DCJS staff request approval to fund the nine PAPIS programs for FY2025 (July 1, 2024-June 30, 2025), totaling \$3,596,429, using general appropriation funds allocated for this purpose.
