

## **Crisis Response in** Virginia



In the aftermath of a crisis in Virginia, there are teams of trained responders ready to assist with the needs of the victims.



## What is a Crisis Response Team?

The Virginia Crisis Response Team (CRT) is composed of volunteers trained to provide trauma mitigation and education in the aftermath of a critical incident.

Team members have received a minimum of 24 hours of skills-based, field tested training developed by the National Organization for Victim Assistance (NOVA).

## Regional vs. State Response



Crisis Response Teams serve specific geographical areas of the Commonwealth. These regional teams respond to small-scale *criminal* events in which assistance is requested from the public or locality.

In the event of a State-Level response after a mass-casualty *criminal* event, the Crisis Response Teams would be coordinated by the Department of Criminal Justice Services and the Virginia Victims Fund, per §19.2-11.01 of the Code of Virginia.



- What assistance is provided?
- · Coordination of victim advocate response
- Provide group and individual crisis intervention services
- Respond to Family Assistance Center (ESF6) to provide assistance (state response only)
- Utilize local advocates from grant programs to work with families long term
- Provide support to local Victim-Witness programs that do not have the capacity to provide services to victims in a mass casualty event/critical incident
- Work with the locality to ensure that their policies and procedures are victimcentered and address the needs of victims (short and long term)
- Request federal funding through the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), if applicable (state response only)
- Work with federal consultants to assess the short and long term needs of survivors and the community (state response only)
- Anniversary/Memorial Planning
