This interactive presentation will examine how experiences of gender-based violence create pathways for girls into the juvenile justice system. Participants will explore racial disparities amongst girls impacted by the legal system and identify strategies to develop survivor-centered, gender-responsive, and culturally-sensitive approaches to address the needs of vulnerable girls and prevent them from experiencing the Abuse to Prison Pipeline.
