



GMS Synopsis Report Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program 2016-DJ-BX-0482 Jan 2020 - Jun 2020

The following report covers grantee reported activity for grant number 2016-DJ-BX-0482 awarded to Jan 2020 - Jun 2020. The award, in the amount of \$3,359,808.00, was issued as part of the BJA FY 16 JAG State solicitation. Any funds reported only represent an estimate of dollars allocated or used for activities covered by this award.

Project Description

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG) allows states and units of local government, including tribes, to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime based on their own state and local needs and conditions. Grant funds can be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and information systems for criminal justice, including for any one or more of the following program areas: 1) law enforcement programs; 2) prosecution and court programs; 3) prevention and education programs; 4) corrections and community corrections programs; 5) drug treatment and enforcement programs; 6) planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs; and 7) crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation). The Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services will utilize Fiscal Year 2016 JAG funds to implement projects utilizing evidence-based practices designed to respond to the priority issues identified through a statewide criminal justice planning process and through subsequent surveys, analyses and consultations with stakeholders. Community-Based Gun Violence Prevention: Applicants are invited to fund evidence-based programs aimed at reducing gun violence in a targeted community or to develop comprehensive strategies to examine systemic issues in their communities that may be contributing to gun violence. Potential programs for consideration include Operation Ceasefire, Operation Peace-Keeper, Rapid Engagement of Support in the Event of Trauma, The Cure Violence Model, and other programs that can be found on https://crimesolutions.gov and https://www.urban.org.2. Trauma-Informed Care for Local Pretrial/Probation and Law Enforcement Officers: To address the primary and secondary traumatic stress that officers experience as a result of their job, applicants may apply for funding to develop or identify trauma-informed care targeted specifically to address trauma among pretrial and local probation officers and law enforcement officers.3. Reducing Implicit Bias in the Criminal Justice System: To minimize disparities throughout the criminal justice system and reduce implicit bias, applicants may apply for funding to develop or identify curriculum and conduct training(s) for local pretrial and probation agencies and law enforcement agencies.4. Youth Engagement Programs: To facilitate positive relationships with law enforcement and their communities, applicants are invited to fund programs that will encourage law enforcement engagement with youth through activities, programs, conferences, workshops or similar joint endeavors.5. Automated System Notification of Upcoming Court Hearings and Related Meetings: Applicants are invited to apply for the purchase of technology solutions to reduce failure to appear rates for court hearings and related meetings with attorneys or probation officers, and/or to make those meetings more productive by reminding clients</p>	In progress	<p>We made over 104 grants. Gang and Drug Related Crime Reduction: To address criminal activity associated with gang activity and the drug trade, applicants are invited to support existing task forces and law enforcement initiatives focused on these criminal activities. Projects should seek to enhance law enforcement services provided to affected areas, to improve crime prevention programs, and to implement effective, targeted initiatives aimed at reducing gang and drug activity.7. Community Policing: To assist agencies with developing, implementing, and supporting community policing strategies and initiatives, funds are available for projects to develop effective community policing strategies, to increase the number of agencies using proven community policing strategies, and to increase awareness of community policing programs.

services, and resources available to community members following a homicide or other traumatic community event. The Hampton Commonwealth's Attorney, partnering with the John Hopkins Center for Gun Policy and Research, was awarded \$142,300 to implement The Violent Crime Review (VCR), which collects, analyzes, and interprets data on violent crime to identify patterns and root cause in order to develop recommendations to reduce violent crime in Hampton. "Our ability to address and curb violent crime in our communities requires a collaborative approach between public safety, community-based organizations, and community members," said Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security Brian Moran. "This grant funding is key to supporting these critical partnerships and part of Governor Northam's holistic approach to addressing the day-to-day gun violence in our most vulnerable communities."
