4. Discuss some of the challenges or changes to your program faced during the course of the reporting period.

The biggest challenge during this third quarter reporting period is the navigation change during COVID-19. Victim services have looked very different during this time and advocates have been very innovative to ensure that services are still provided and maintained to clients. Social media has been one way that continued contact has increased. The surge in community concern for individuals has created an increase in hotline calls and contacts; but a decrease in police referrals made due to the limits on their calls. Support groups are created using Facebook Live and Zoom, and those fleeing domestic violence are being put in hotels that work with the safety and privacy of our clients. When needing to obtain a protective order, advocates have used Facetime with magistrates and video services within the courts to obtain these necessary orders of safety. Though the changes are temporary, they have been effective in continuing necessary safety measures to victims of violent crimes.

5. Provide one brief case study that illustrates and describes the services provided with VSGP funding. Do not use victim names or include any other identifying information.

Advocate met "Sami" at court while obtaining a protective order. Her husband, whom she had recently left, had come to confront her while she was at work. Sami worked at a private christian school in the area, where her abuser broke down her classroom door, while students were present. Police were contacted and EPO obtained for client. Advocate provided one on one counseling, support group date and times, court accompaniment, liaison assistance for the HOPE card program and how to subpoena witnesses for her continued case. Advocate further offered her services to the students and any other faculty at the school that would want to talk further about what happened that day. Principal did want advocate to offer a presentation to the school - Pre-K through 12th grade to discuss these "real life" events and answer any questions students may have. Unfortunately, school was closed for the year before the scheduled date of presentation, but advocate has given information to the school to offer to any parent and/or youth. Advocate has been in contact with several and continues to work with client as well. These are through hotline calls, e-mails, and two face to face visits.

6. Describe any emerging issues or notable trends affecting crime victim services in your service area.

Notable trends that we have seen continue to emerge is the drug crisis that has inundated our serving area. Most domestic violence cases are simultaneously linked to drug use and charges, or alcohol abuse. As the use of meth has replaced opioids as the number one drug of choice in southwest Virginia; the abuse of suboxone clinics have further become a trend. Not only does this exacerbate abusive situations, but the financial and dependent factors increase when this dynamic is involved. As this reporting period ended, telehealth in regard to mental health and drug abuse has become an option for individuals in the area. This is the first time this type of service has been offered in the area and will hopefully allow some different options for rehab and mental health services. Advocates are offering this service with each client they encounter as a hopefully additional resource to allow victims a way out of an abusive relationship or situation.
