STOP Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program

- In sections D, E, and subsections A2, C1, C2, and C4-C8, subgrantees must answer an initial question about whether they supported certain activities during the current reporting period. If the response is yes, then the subgrantee must complete that section or subsection. If the response is no, the rest of that section or subsection is skipped.

For example,

- 1. If you are a victim services agency providing education and victim services with staff funded under this grant, you would complete A1, A2, B, C2, C3, D, and F (and answer 'no' in C1, C4-C8, and E1-E5).
- 2. If you are a law enforcement agency receiving funds to pay for staff who provide training to other law enforcement, you would complete A1, A2, B, C1, C3, and F (and answer 'no' in C2, C4-C8, D, and E1-E5).

If you are required to provide a match for your STOP Program subgrant, report on activities supported with this match. The activities of volunteers or interns should be reported if they were coordinated or supervised by STOP Program-funded staff or if STOP Program funds substantially supported their activities.

For further information on filling out this form, refer to the separate instructions, which contain detailed definitions and examples illustrating how questions should be answered.

As the prior VSTOP prosecutor (Jennifer Guiliano) was the Chair of the DVTF, she attended these meetings through November 25, 2019. Erin Barr, the current VSTOP prosecutor, attended the December 16, 2019 meeting of the DVTF. Ms. Barr is a member of the training committee of the DVTF. The DVTF this year has worked diligently under Ms. Guiliano's lead to improve public awareness, provide trainings, and refund an account used to assist victims of domestic violence financially. In 2020, the goal is to provide more in-depth trainings and continue to fundraise and raise awareness in the community.

Greg Overholser, the interim VSTOP prosecutor, attended and participated in the Criminal Justice InterAgency Team (CJIA) during the reporting period. The CJIA team works to improve the criminal justice system's interactions with victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

Erin Barr, the current VSTOP prosecutor, regularly attended and participated in the Chesterfield County Fatality Review Team during the reporting period. This Team reviews domestic homicides in the County to analyze where services could have been provided to prevent violence.

Our 2019 Annual Report has skewed numbers because until April 2019, our office was counting all domestic violence prosecutions handled by the seven prosecutors in our office. In April 2019, the VSTOP prosecutor, after training, correct this practice and only tracked the cases he or she was handling. Therefore, the biannual July 2019-December 2019 reflects accurate numbers, but the 2019 Annual still has a mix of both statistics. The other correction made in April 2019 was the reporting of charges that were "nolle prossed." These were previously being recorded as dismissals. In April 2019, we corrected that practice to record them as "declined prosecutions."


