



Information from Raliance Overview Report Nov. 2017: How Sport Can End Sexual Violence in One Generation

- Because of this, sport can make an extensive impact on sexual violence prevention.
- The sport community can become part of the solution to support a culture that prevents sexual violence.

S.534, or The Protecting Young Victims from Sexual Abuse and Safe Sport Authorization Act of 2017

Designates the Center to serve as the **independent** national safe sport organization,

with the responsibility for developing policies and procedures to prevent the emotional, physical and sexual abuse of amateur athletes.



SafeSport Code Enforcement Authority

Exclusive authority

- Sexual misconduct
- Conduct related to the underlying sexual misconduct

Discretionary authority

 Other misconduct – bullying, harassment, physical and emotional abuse, etc.



Sexual misconduct →


 We respond to any report of a SafeSport Code violation involving sexual misconduct for the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Movements.

Other misconduct →

We take on other types of Code violations on a case-by-case basis.

Response and Resolution

Investigating

Expert investigation →

 Experts in the field evaluate each report and pursue matters within the Center's purview.

Sanctions →

 Sanctions, up to a lifetime ban across all Olympic sports, can be issued by the Center when a SafeSport Code violation is substantiated.



Sanctioning Guidelines

Sanctions

- Warning, loss of privileges, behavioral requirement, educational program, probation, suspension or other eligibility restrictions
- Searchable database

Considerations


Violation, prior history, age of individuals involved, aggravating + mitigating circumstances

Effect






Incident Dates (n= 540)
