Concerns

- Gun-free zones are attractive targets
- Inspire magazine: schools and large gatherings of unarmed people are attractive targets; how to make a propane bomb
- Active incidents, lethality and threats have increased; not just guns
- Vehicle-borne explosives and vehicle attacks
- Majority of AS events occur at businesses
- Hundreds of concerning behavior reports

Success relies on secure campuses

• Few cops/security around: can't see it all

- Empower yourself to play a key role in keeping your workplace safe
 - You can assist police ("When seconds count, the police arrive in minutes".)
 - Report suspicious/concerning/unusual behavior
 - You can transform your location into a hard target

Be in Condition Yellow

- Be aware of your surroundings.
- When we see what we expect, we dismiss it as normal. Avoid uncritical complacency.
 - FedEx, Utility truck, Caterer, Landscaper
 - Police, fire, military uniforms
- Are these people doing any of the following?
 - Surveillance
 - Elicitation
 - Testing security
 - Acquiring resources
 - Rehearsal
 - Impersonation

Indicators: potential terrorist activities

- Eliciting info
- Testing security
- Recruiting
- Observation/surveillance
- Materials acquisition and storage
- Weapons discovery

- Breach/attempted intrusion
- Misrepresentation
- Theft/loss/diversion
- Sabotage/tampering/ vandalism
- Cyber attack
- Aviation activity
- Expressed/implied threat

Suspicious behavior factors

- Nervousness
- Sweating
- Patting self
- Hands in pocket
- Talking to oneself
- Favoring one side of body
- Taking photos
- Making drawings
- Loitering

- Reading, but not turning pages
- Clothing contradicts weather/circumstances
- Many/bulging pockets
- Concealed weapon?
- Abnormal cell phone use
- Diversions
 - Carrying groceries
 - Walking a pet
 - Pushing a carriage

Concerning behaviors

- Individuals typically do not just "snap", but display indicators of potentially violent behavior over time. Often, these behaviors, if recognized, can be managed and treated.
- Signs of potentially violent behaviors (often considered by NOVA's TAT) may include some of the following:
 - Increased use of alcohol and/or illegal drugs
 - Unexplained increase in absenteeism, vague physical complaints
 - Noticeable decrease in attention to appearance and hygiene
 - Depression/ withdrawal
 - Resistance and overreaction to changes in policy and procedures
 - Repeated violations of company/school policies
 - Increased severe mood swings
 - Noticeably unstable, emotional responses
 - Explosive outburst of anger or rage without provocation
 - Suicidal; comments about "putting things in order"
 - Behavior which is suspect of paranoia "everybody is against me"
 - Increasingly talks of problems at home
 - Escalation of domestic problems in the workplace; talk of severe financial problems
 - Talk of previous incidents of violence
 - Empathy with individuals committing violence
 - Increase in unsolicited comments about firearms, other dangerous weapons and violent crimes

Potential targets/activities "CARVER"

(Criticality, Accessibility, Recognizability, Vulnerability, Effect, Recuperability)

- Administration/Financial
- Employee concentrations (e.g., fire drill)
- Controversial exhibitions
- Sporting/entertainment venues
- Construction sites
- Control facilities (HVAC, computer)
- Laboratories (HAZMAT)
- Open house/Convocations
- Others?

Suspicious vehicles

- No parking zone
- Unattended (e.g., UPS truck 3 hours)
- Duration
- Tinted windows
- Cluttered interior
- Hood up; flat tire
- Obscured or no license plate (crucial info)
- Bumper stickers
- Odors (e.g., fertilizer; diesel fuel)

VBIED indicators

- Sagging suspension
- Illegally parked near entrances/crowded access points
- Covered/tinted windows
- License plate altered or removed
- Odors of gas, propane, acids, chemicals
- Visible wires, switches, batteries, watches, cell phones, timers
- Cargo concealed with tarp or blanket
- Interior panels removed or out of place

Suspicious packages and letters

- Distorted or unintelligible handwriting
- Incorrect titles
- Cut and paste lettering
- No return address
- Excess weight or uneven weight distribution
- Common words misspelled
- Stains, odor, wires, or noise
- Special delivery
- Excessive tape

Concealed weapons indicators

- Print
- Bulges
- Gait
- Security pat
- Sagging jacket
- One arm stationary

Obstacles to Reporting

- People are reluctant to:
 - Get involved
 - Report friends
 - Bother the police (fear of being wrong)
- Uncertain if a crime was witnessed
- Don't trust instincts
- Fear of retaliation
- 9-1-1 is scary; some international students are unaware
- Fear accusation of racism/profiling
- Fear of violating HIPPA, FERPA, etc. confidentiality laws
- Some fear police (cultural)
- Some disdain interacting with authority

Let's address these obstacles!

Fear of racism/profiling accusation

- People are not suspicious; Behavior is suspicious
- Race, gender, and ethnicity are incidental to the concerning behavior
 - Dispatch will ask for appropriate identifying info
 Examples:
 - There is a large man wearing a hoodie and full-length raincoat. It's sunny and 95 degrees.
 - There's a person photographing the parking garage.
 - Someone is asking about the size of the police force.

Fear of violating HIPPA, FERPA, FOIA, etc.

- Safety overrides confidentiality
 Exceptions allowed in above laws
- Title 22 provides exception for safety concern
- FERPA: *may* (not must) protect info
- Emphasize safety concern

- I am reporting X because I have a safety concern...

Fear of Police Authority; Unwillingness to Interact with Police

- Newsletter
- New Student Orientations
- F-1 orientations
- Presentations and training
- Classroom instruction
- Patrol
- Support of clubs and organizations
- Community outreach

What you can do

- Expect the unexpected, especially from the familiar
- Meet and greet: invite police and share concerns
- Trust your instincts
- Do not cluster/avoid clusters
- Scan entire area: look outward, not only inward
- Think small (vehicle tag is more important than color)
- Anonymous reporting
- Use other reporting channels besides police dispatch
- Discuss with colleagues

- Who is involved? (#s and descriptions?)
- What is the behavior?
- Where?
- When?
- How is it being done?
- Why? (motive?)

- Other information:
 - Weapons
 - Transportation assets
 - Direction of travel
 - Injuries

Summary

- The police are necessary but not sufficient for safety
- YOU can deter crime by making your facility a hard target
- Safety concern is the key reporting justification
- Report suspicious behavior, *not* people
 - Protects you
 - Protects your business
 - No liability
- Trust your "gift of fear"
- Tell someone
 - Anonymity can be protected, in most cases
 - Accommodations can be made
- Don't fear being wrong or subject to criticism
- Personal safety is our common goal
