This interactive workshop is designed for law enforcement and public safety practitioners interested in applying Evidence-Based Policing (EBP) as part of their homicide and violent crime reduction efforts. The workshop defines Evidence-Based Policing (EBP) and explores how it can be applied as part of effective policing in today's dynamic and, at times, chaotic environment. The workshop is facilitated by Adam P. Wojcicki, Deputy Director of the Virginia Center for Policing Innovation (VCPI) and principal author of the Applied Evidence-Based Policing Practices: Homicide and Violent Crime Reduction (HVR) program developed by VCPI in partnership with the U.S. Department of Justice, COPS Office. Tapping into a decade's worth of resources and experience delivering the HVR program throughout the nation, this workshop will share key concepts and guidance on using EBP as a practical tool for decision-making while recognizing the challenge of being a "good consumer of evidence" in today's policing environment.

Hospital-based Violence Intervention Programs: Treating

Hospital-based violence intervention programs (HVIP) are multidisciplinary programs that combine the efforts of medical staff with trusted community-based partners to provide safety planning, case management services, and trauma-informed care to violently injured people. The Virginia HVIP Collaborative began in 2019 with funding from the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) to the Virginia Hospital and Healthcare Association Foundation. With the support of DCJS Funding, there are currently five community violence HVIPs across the Commonwealth. The session will open with a brief presentation on what it means to treat violence as a public health issue, components of the HVIP model, what these programs hope to achieve and how they collaborate with local police agencies. The remaining time will be devoted to allowing the panelists to share what got them into HVIP work, why they view it as rewarding, the challenges of building and implementing a new program, and their hopes for the future of violence prevention.

Managing Media and Messaging

(CSBs) to conduct a statewide gambling and gaming needs assessment using: an environmental scan, a community readiness assessment, a survey of young adults ages 18–25, and adding a gambling question to the youth risk behavior survey. The survey of young adults included questions on gambling, alcohol, tobacco, drugs, mental health, suicide, and ACES. This session will include information on the findings from the statewide assessment on health behaviors. Along with the data, attendees will learn about some of the problem gambling prevention strategies that local CSBs are working on that attendees may want to tap into.

Understanding Mass Violence and Promoting Survivor Recovery and Resilience

Julia Fuller-Wilson, State Crisis Response Coordinator/ Violence Against Women Program Administrator, Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services

Dawn Bush, Outreach and Training Specialist, Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services

Our worst-case scenario of an individual targeting our communities in the most unexpected ways has become an increasing reality. What do we know about those that commit mass violence? What do survivors need, both short and long term? How can we best plan and prepare for these kinds of nightmare scenarios happening in our communities? This session will discuss the current trends and research regarding the prevalence of mass casualty events and those that perpetrate these crimes. The presenters will utilize case examples of what has worked and what lessons they have learned in responding to mass violence events in Virginia. Most significantly, they will ensure that communities know what services and resources are available following a criminal mass casualty event or critical incident to best support survivors. Lastly, they will identify strategies that promote resilience and recovery.

Stalking and Counter Stalking

Mark Wynn, Founder, Mark Wynn Consulting, Nashville Metropolitan Police Department, Tennessee (retired)

Stalking is often called the next phase in a violent relationship. This session will enlighten the participants to the growing crime of stalking in domestic/sexual violence incidents. The participants will have an improved understanding of stalking personalities and behavior, the impact on victims, level of danger, establishing probable cause, investigative tactics, understanding stalking with technology, countermeasures, prevention, and safety planning.

Project Safe Neighborhoods

Heather Perez, Training and Technical Assistance Coordinator, Michigan State University

The Bureau of Justice Assistance-supported Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN) program is a nationwide initiative which entails federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement officials, prosecutors, corrections, community leaders, and other stakeholders partnering to identify the most pressing violent crime problems in their communities. An array of evidence-based/informed strategies and solutions are selected to address data driven identified issues. Four Design elements guide PSN implementation: *Community Engagement; Prevention and Intervention; Focused and Strategic Enforcement;* and *Accountability.* Examples of successful partnerships, strategies and training, and technical assistance availability will be offered.

8:45 AM – 10:15 AM **Domestic/Sexual Violence Intervention, Effective Investigation, Community Collaboration, and Response**

Mark Wynn, Founder, Mark Wynn Consulting, Nashville Metropolitan Police Department, Tennessee (retired)

Law enforcement officers engage in dangerous encounters when enforcing the law or protecting and serving the public. Unfortunately, while officers respond to domestic disturbances, the lethality risks for them increases significantly. Notably, 2022 was one of the deadliest years for officers and deputies responding to incidents of domestic and sexual violence. This workshop will examine the officer safety considerations that arise when responding to a domestic violence call. In addition, the presenter will discuss the complexities and challenges facing officers when interacting with offenders, victims, and witnesses at the scene of a domestic violence incident. Additionally, the presenter will explore research and case studies to demonstrate the possible dangers of responding to the call. Steps for safely managing on-scene investigations of the domestic violence calls will also be discussed.

The phenomenon of mass shooters emulating previous killers has existed for many decades, but this so-called copycat problem has both accelerated and evolved in the era of digital media. Ever since the Columbine tragedy in 1999, high-profile attacks have drawn sensational news coverage, further motivating fame-seeking perpetrators. It is crucial to understand that shooter-focused news coverage and social media content do not cause a person to commit violence, nor is there scientific evidence that graphically violent entertainment does so. In the world of behavioral threat assessment, the more useful way to think about media influences is to recognize their possible association with warning behaviors—as potential additional clues to an individual heading down a dangerous path.

Shortly after lunch on May 7, 2019, three days before the end of the school year, two disgruntled students attempted to execute a classroom full of fellow students over a lie. Four firearms, hundreds of bullets, and a rehearsed story...all unraveled by five heroes. The analysis by the prosecutor, who also handled the Columbine High School mass murder and the Aurora Theater (Batman) mass murder, reveals failures of the system at multiple points and lessons learned.

Fentanyl is quickly becoming one of the most dangerous and challenging drug-related threats to communities and law enforcement officials across the United States. Fentanyl is a synthetic opiate used as a surgical anesthetic or as a narcotic to treat chronic and severe pain. It is most used in cancer patients; however, over the last couple of years, it has been blamed for the death of thousands of Americans.

Holly Dunn shares her personal story of survival and how it has motivated and inspired her to reach out to others. Her understanding and compassion help her to relate to others who may be struggling with the horrific aftermath that accompanies sexual violence and assault. The only known survivor of a serial killer, she refuses to let it negatively affect her life by using her tragic experience for the good of others. Her personal mission and intense passion to be an advocate for women who have been victims of similar violence has led her to a life of public service and outreach. Ms. Dunn lends insight into her personal healing process and explains how she was able to continue her education and use her experience to jump full steam into a life of advocacy and community involvement.

Members from a broad range of organizations (law enforcement, corrections, business, education, houses of worship, law, health care, etc.) are increasingly aware of subjects that may present an ongoing risk for concerning or violent behaviors. These may include (but not be limited to) incidents of targeted violence or terrorism impacting schools, campuses, workplaces, or other community settings. These individuals can be highly disruptive, not only in the school, campus, or workplace settings, but in the community at large. Incidents from around the world have underscored the ongoing need for collaborative and integrated strategies to prevent targeted violence where possible, and to mitigate risk of harm where necessary. More and more communities are developing community-wide approaches to identify, assess and manage potential threats in lawful and collaborative ways. This session will provide an overview of community-based threat management approaches and considerations for program implementation.
